The 2016 African American population in Iowa. African Americans constitute 3.7% of the state's total population. In 1980, African Americans made up 1.4% of the state's total population.

The percent change in the African American population from 1980 to 2016. This is a 73,174 numeric increase for the period.

The projected African American population of Iowa in 2050, according to Woods & Pool Economics Inc.(2017). African Americans will constitute 6.8 percent of the state's total population.

The median age of Iowa's African American population in 2016. The median age for the state of Iowa is 39.7.

Families and Children

22,035

The number of African American families in 2016 who reside in Iowa. Of these families, 77.7 percent include their own children under 18 years of age.

136.2%

Percent increase in the number of African American families in the state of Iowa from 1980 to 2016. Since 1980, the number of African American families have increased by 12,707.

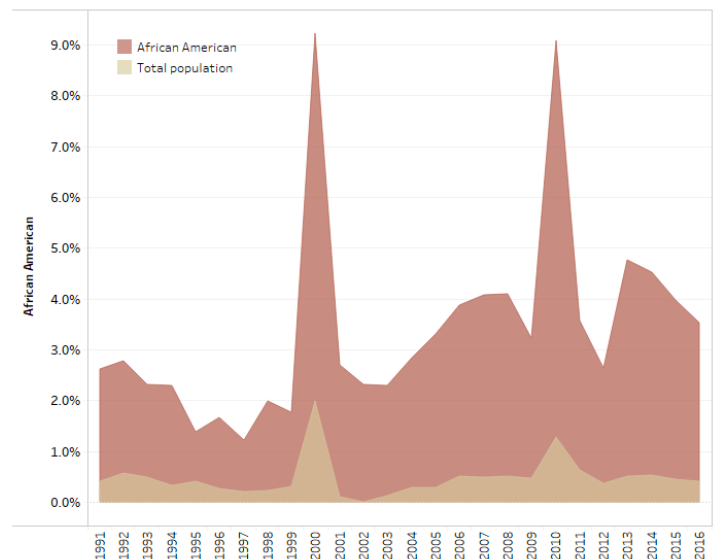
9.9%

Percentage of the African American population under age 5, in 2016. African Americans have a higher concentration of preschoolers among the population than the state as a whole (6.4%).

The percent change of African Americans in Polk County from 2000-2016. Polk county has the largest population of African Americans of any Iowa county.

69,084

The African American population in four counties: Polk, Scott, Black Hawk, and Linn in 2016. This accounts for over half of the total African American population in Iowa.

23.4%

The percent of the African American population living in Des Moines. Des Moines has the largest population (23,469) of African Americans in any city in Iowa.

9.2%

The percent of total population in Black Hawk County who were African American in 2016. Other Iowa counties with a high percentage of African Americans are Scott (7.6%), Polk (6.8%), Johnson (6.8%) and Des Moines (5.8%).

56.4%

Over half of the growth in Iowa's African American population from 2010-2016 occurred in three counties: Polk, Johnson, and Linn.

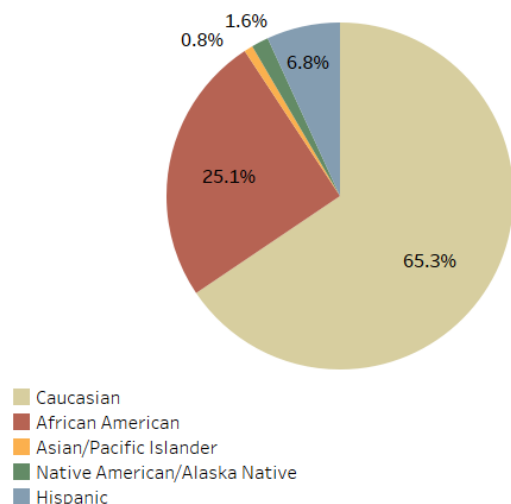
The percent of the total population in Waterloo who are African American. Other Iowa cities with a high percentage of African Americans are Davenport (11.4%), and Coralville (11.3%).

The median income in the of African American households in 2016. The median household income for the state during the same time period was \$56,247.

35.7%

The poverty rate in 2016 for the African American population. The corresponding rate for Iowa is 11.8 percent.

\$30,149

The median income of African American families in Iowa in 2016. The median income of families in Iowa was \$72,351.

42.5%

The percentage of families with related children under 18 below the poverty level in 2016 for the African American population. The corresponding rate for Iowa is 12.7 percent.

\$18,070

The per capita money income of Iowa African Americans in 2016. The per capita money income for the state was \$30,047.

The number of African American-owned firms in Iowa in 2012.

The percent increase in African American-owned firms between 1992 and 2012.

The unemployment rate of Iowa African Americans in 2016. In comparison the state of Iowa's unemployment rate was 3.9%.

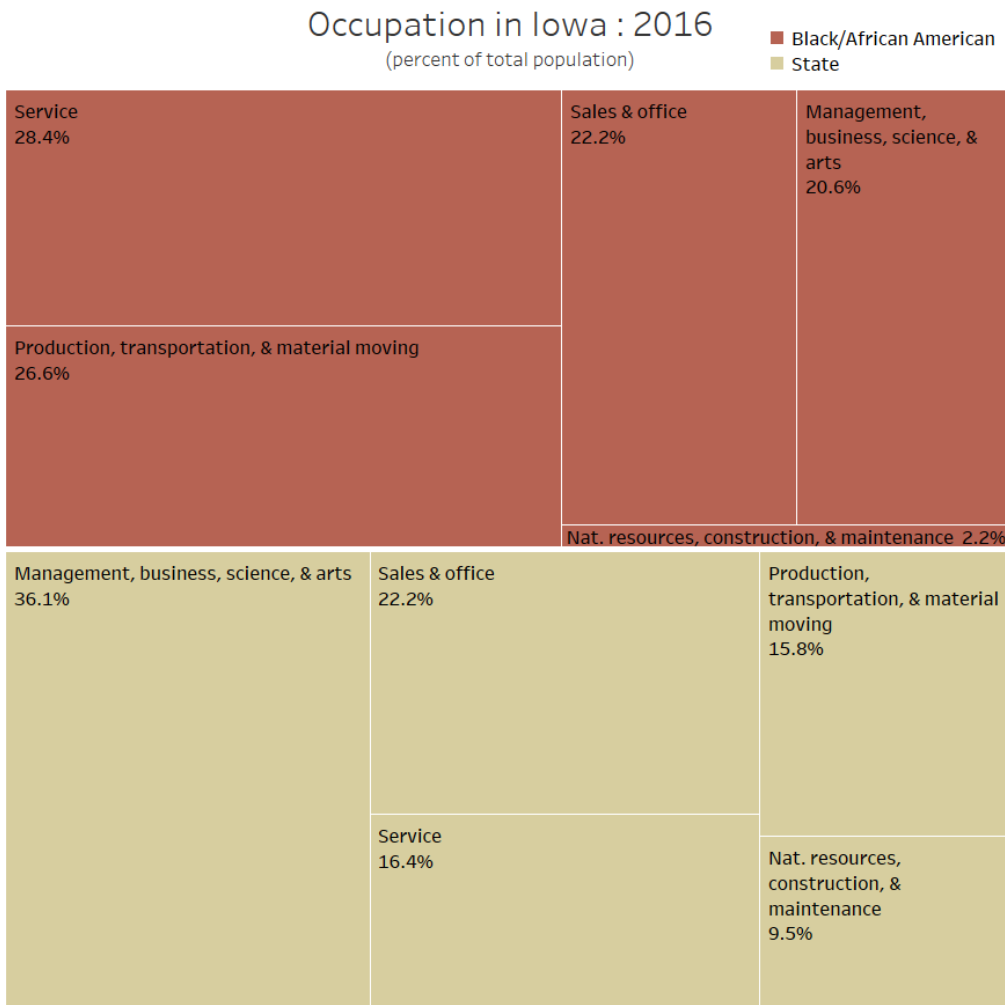
Earnings

The median earnings for Iowa African Americans in 2016. The median earnings for the state of Iowa was \$31,717.

\$32,087

The median earnings for Iowa African American males in 2016. African American women in Iowa had median earnings of \$28,379. In comparison the median earning for men and women in the state of Iowa were \$49,385 and \$37,791 respectively.

The percent of Iowa African Americans in 2015 employed in the Educational services, and health care and social assistance.

Occupation

The percent of African American women in Iowa age 16 years and over in sales and office occupations in 2016. 14.3% of African American men in Iowa are in this occupation.

The African American birth rate per 1,000 population in 2016. The birth rate per 1,000 for the state was 12.5.

Percentage of Iowa African Americans 25 years and older with graduate or professional degree in 2016. The percentage of Iowans with a graduate or professional degree was 9.3%.
