

LATINOS IN IOWA: 2018

SEPTEMBER 2018

In 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim a week in September as National Hispanic Heritage Week. The observance was expanded in 1988 to a month-long celebration (Sept. 15-Oct. 15). During this month, the United States celebrates the culture and traditions of U.S. residents who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America and the Caribbean. Sept. 15 was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.

The estimated Latino population of Iowa as of July 1, 2017, making people of Hispanic or Latino origin the state's largest race or ethnic minority. Latinos constitute 6.0 percent of the state's total population

The projected Latino population of Iowa as of July 1, 2050. According to the 2017 Woods & Poole Economics Inc., Latinos will constitute 12.3 percent of the state's total population on that date.

The number of Latino families in 2017 who reside in Iowa. Of these families, 69.7 percent include related children under 18 years of age.

The number of Latino grandparents in 2017 living with their own grandchildren. 33.0% of those are responsible for the own grandchildren under 18 years of age. This compares to 36.2% for the U.S..

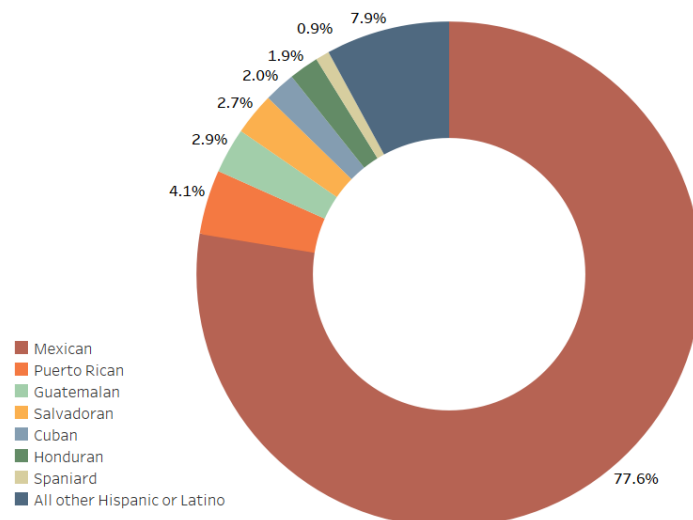

The 2017 median earnings for Hispanics in Iowa. The median earnings for the state of Iowa was \$33,349.

The median earnings for Latino males in 2017 who worked full-time, year round. Latino women in Iowa had median earnings of \$32,582. In comparison the median earning for men and women in the state of Iowa were \$50,295 and \$39,658 respectively.

The number of foreign-born Iowans in 2017 who were born in Mexico, by far more than any other Latin American country or any other country in the world. Other Latin American areas of origin with a large foreign-born population are El Salvador (3,335), Brazil (1,817), Cuba (1386), and Colombia (1,216).

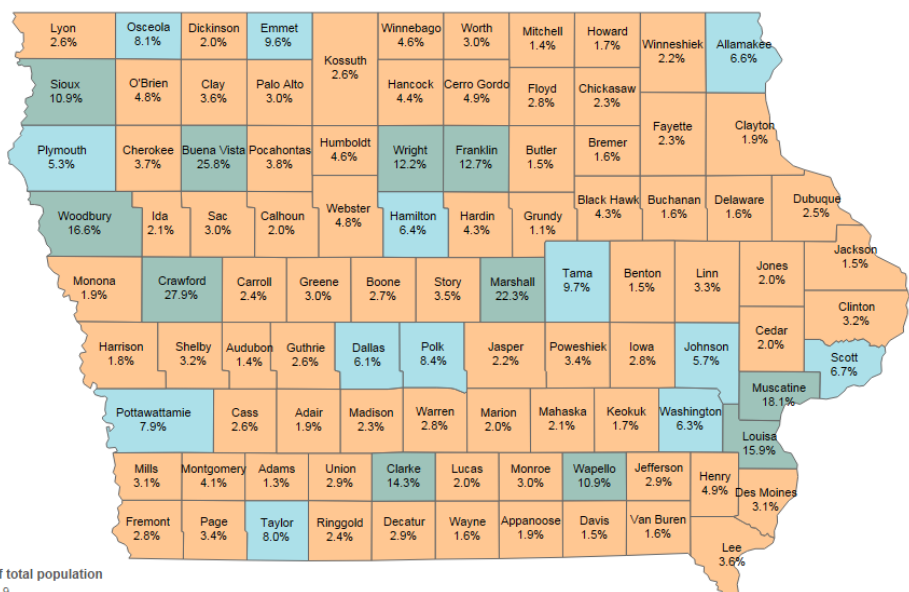

Over half of the total 2017 Latino population live in eight counties Polk, Woodbury, Scott, Marshall, Johnson, Muscatine, Linn, and Pottawattamie.

53.2%

Over half of the growth in Iowa's Latino population from 2000-2017 occurred in seven counties: Polk, Woodbury, Johnson, Marshall, Scott, Linn, and Pottawattamie. The Latino population in Ringgold increased by 830.8% and by 623.8% in Lyon county between 2000 and 2017.
